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WHAT IS DISAPPEARING?

Nine pairs of trousers and shoes are hanging above the gallery. All of them are made of black paper.

Look up.

The black paper trousers are hanging from left to right, from a lower level to a higher level.

There is some foot space between the trousers.

The trousers look like they're queuing and drifting forward in the same direction.

The installation is hung up and supported by wires and aluminum frames.

Two silver wires are hung above the trousers in parallel.

Each pair of paper trousers is attached to an oval aluminum frame at the waistband. The oval frame is supported by four vertical wires that link up the trousers and the two wires above.


The trouser legs are open.

Beneath the cuff are wires that link to the paper shoes. The shoes are actually paper boats that are made of black paper with white marble patterns.

A wire goes through a trouser leg and a coin that is mounted on the insole of the paper shoe.

The gallery lights filter through the paper trousers and paper shoes.
